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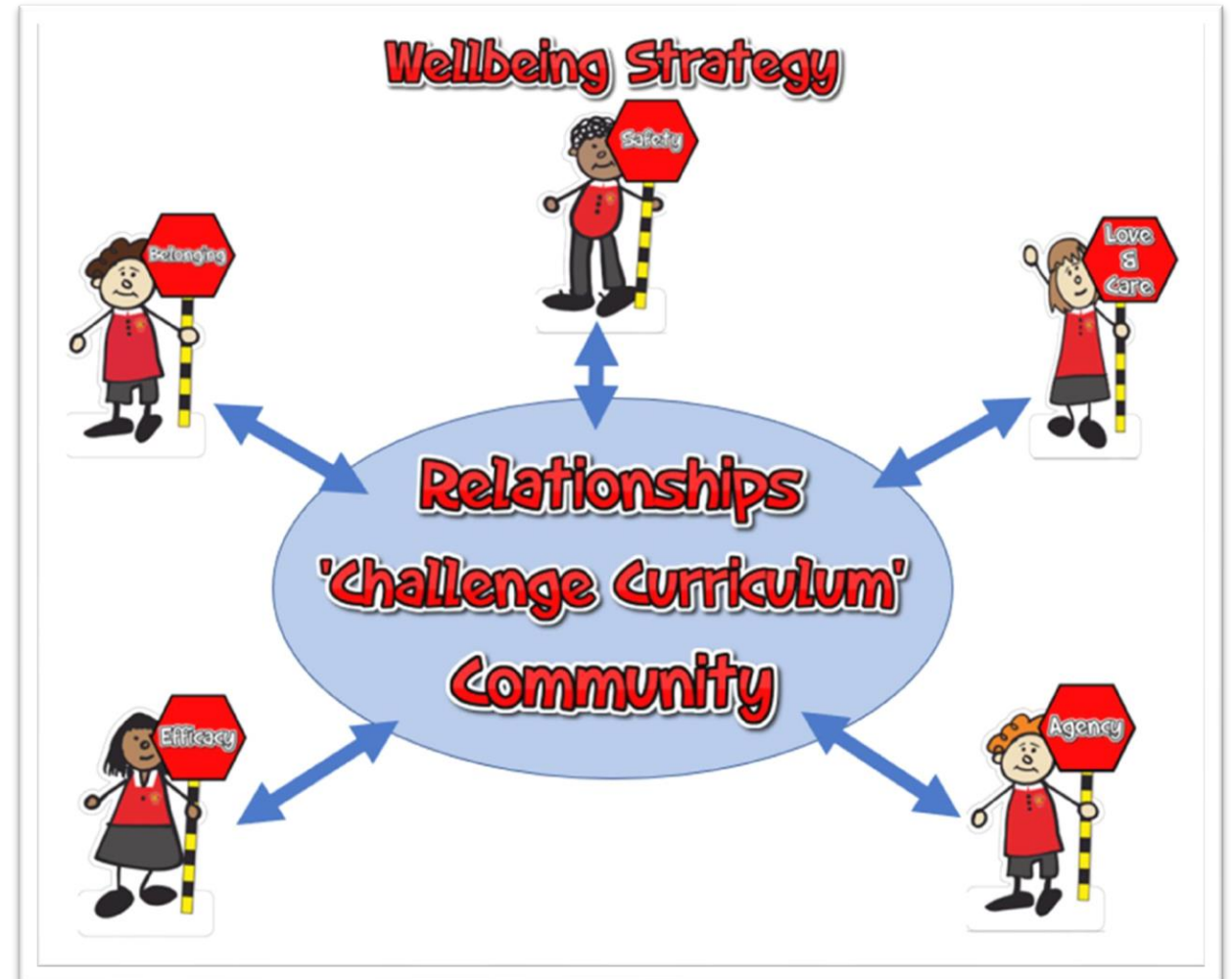
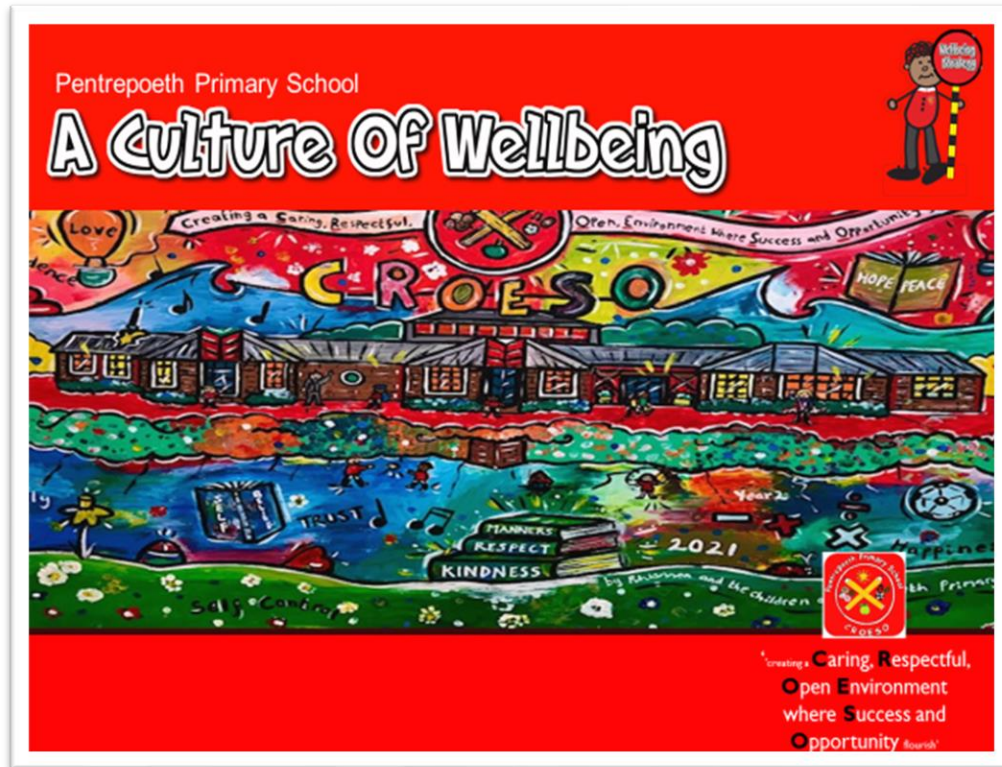

You said...

- Remembering to walk sensibly down the left hand side of the corridors at **all times**
- Constantly** making the right choices
- Paying attention to **all adults**
- Always** working to the best of your ability -doing your best
- Choosing the right time to go to the toilet-break times and lunchtimes
- Always being **well mannered**—saying please and thank you, showing **courtesy** to each other, holding the door open, greeting people politely
- Behaving beautifully on the way to and from school
- Showing good **learning behaviour**
- Following rules**— inside the school building and on the playground
- Show **respect** at all times to all people

What does 'Green' behaviour look like?

You said...

- Listen to the chosen speaker at all times
- Good listening and sitting nicely
- Concentrate in class—try your best and manage your distractions
- Be polite and always use good manners
- Be helpful and work well together
- Always be ready to learn
- Call people by their given names
- Look after school/personal equipment
- Respect all adults-treat them all in the same way
- Care for each other and share
- Walk sensibly around the building
- Always consider other children's feelings and be inclusive
- Always use an appropriate voice in the classroom and around the school

What behaviour might lead to a warning?

You said...

- Choosing to talk at the wrong time
- Walking off without asking
- Spoiling other children's chance to learn
- Being a bit cheeky (answering back)
- Rocking on your chairs
- Not following instructions
- Having poor body language

Remember—if you are given a warning, then you are being given the chance to correct your behaviour.

What does 'Red' behaviour look like?

You said...

- Hurting other children - by hitting, kicking, pushing or with words
- Bullying
- Being defiant - ignoring a direct instruction from a grown up or using bad body language and facial expressions
- Not correcting your behaviour when you are on a 'warning'
- Using bad language
- Lying to a teacher
- Being offensive towards others.

What should happen if you use 'Red' behaviours?

You said...

- Go to supervised play
- Miss out on treats
- Contact parents by letter if you have been to supervised play 3 times

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Rewards

We use the Class Dojo system across the school. All children are able to obtain points in different categories. These points result in children receiving a Bronze Award for 100 points. There is also a Silver Award, a Gold Award and a Platinum award to obtain after that!

The categories children can obtain points for are:

Years 3-6 – Homework, Behaviour, Manners, kindness and Respect, Wow Work

Rec - Year 2– I'm a Superstar, manners, kindness and Respect, Wow Work

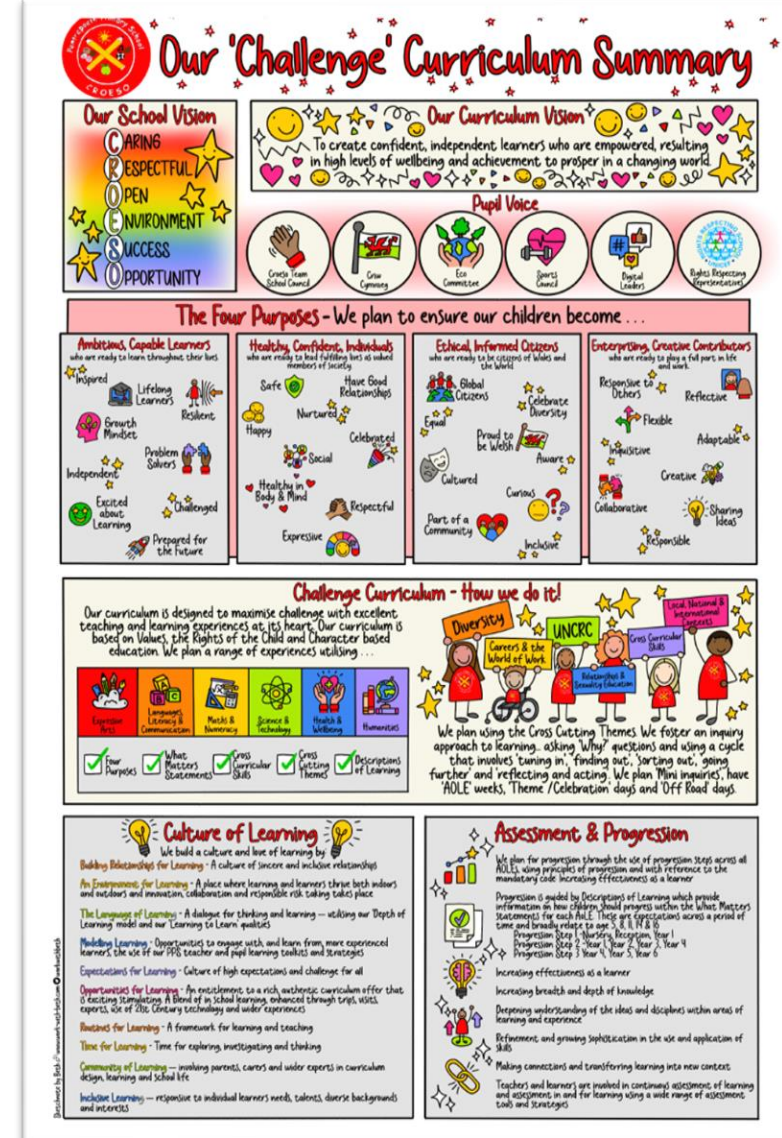
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Contexts and Experiences

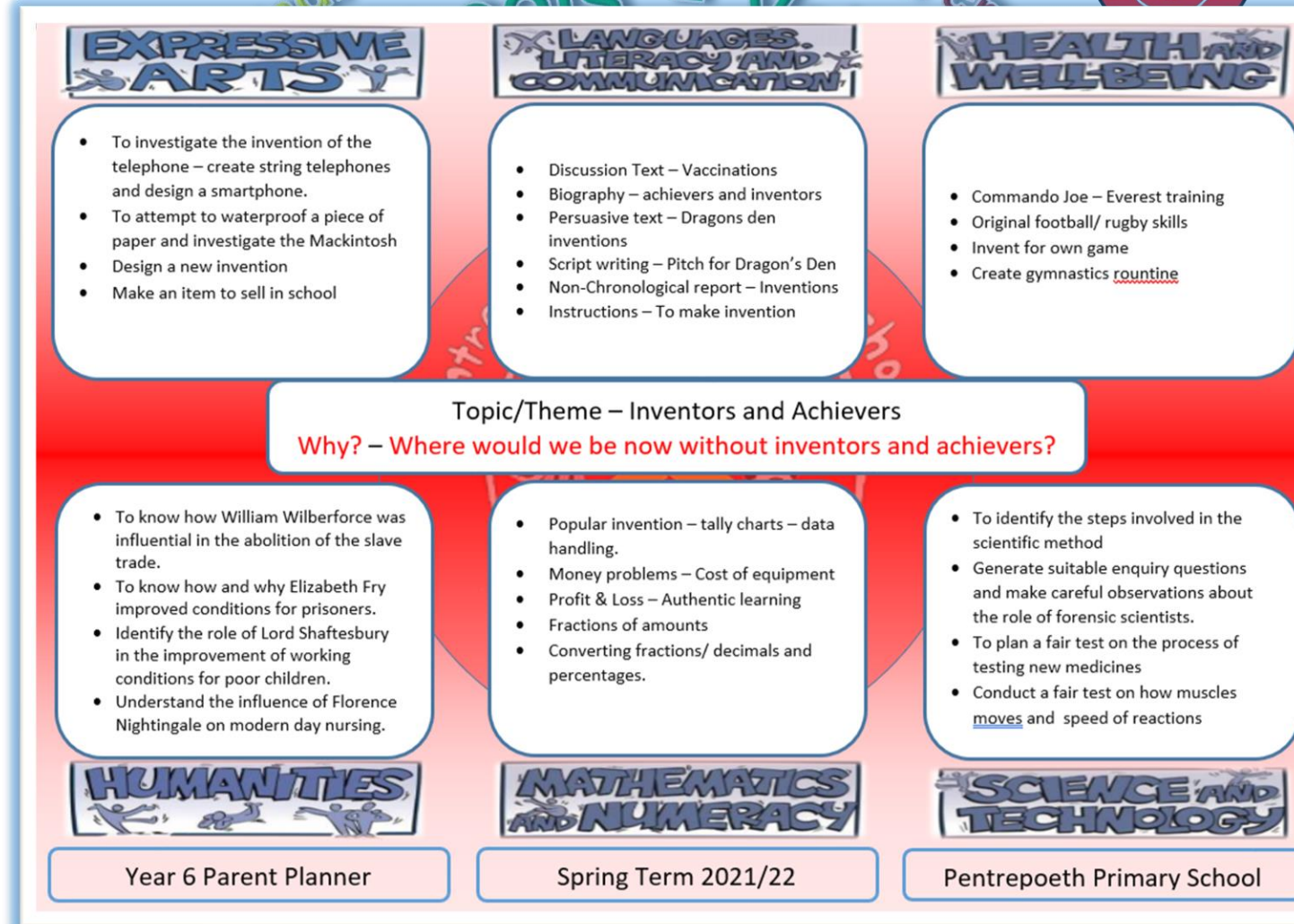
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Planning for Progression

We plan using the Cross Cutting Themes. We foster an inquiry approach to learning... asking 'Why?' questions and using a cycle that involves 'tuning in', 'finding out', 'sorting out', 'going further' and 'reflecting and acting'. We plan 'Mini inquiries', have 'AOLE' weeks, 'Theme / Celebration' days and 'Off Road' days.



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Play is one of the most important ways in which children learn. It underpins formal learning later in childhood, but also enables the individual child to develop their self-worth.

In fact the right to play is deemed so fundamental to children's wellbeing, that it is enshrined by the UN as a universal children's right.

It strengthens powers of concentration, essential for a successful future in the classroom, and underpins everything from learning social interactions and norms, to the beginnings of scientific thinking.

The Importance of Play

According to the book 'Einstein Never Used Flash Cards' by Golinkoff, Hirsh-Pasek, and Eyer, play can be broken down in to five core elements:

- Be fun and enjoyable
- Have no set goals
- Be spontaneous and voluntary
- Involve active engagement
- Involve an element of make-believe



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Sand play is a fantastic opportunity for the foundations of scientific learning, and developing self-confidence and physical development. Scooping, digging, pouring and sifting teaches children how things work, whilst also building their muscles and coordination. Done alongside a little pal, and it becomes about teamwork, sharing, and social skills.



Sand



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Similar to sand play, water play enables children to experiment in a safe environment with basic concepts such as volume. Additionally, water play is great for learning consequences of actions. Add in some hand-eye coordination and physical strength, and water play is a firm favourite.



Water Play



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Play dough has immense potential for learning. Not only does it strengthen fingers in preparation for a lifetime of writing, it teaches fine motor skills, creativity and hand-eye coordination. Add some beads to the dough for a fine-motor exercise, or get the kids threading beads on to lengths of dried spaghetti held in the dough, for extra play-value.



Play Dough



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Let the children loose with a bunch of dressing-up clothes and props such as toy doctor's kits, and let their imaginations run wild. Soon you'll discover the budding doctor, vet, nurse, astronaut, chef or thespian. Dressing-up helps children to begin to make sense of the adult world, roles, and interests, as well as boosting social interaction. Not least, dressing-up helps to reinforce the self-care aspects of self-dressing which is essential for primary school life.



Dress Up And Role Play



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Providing characters in the form of mini-figures and dolls allows both girls and boys to develop their social play. It encourages imagination and the expression (and labelling) of feelings.



Doll and Character Play



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Letting children run wild with paints and drawing tools allows them to experience their world in a sensory way and develop self-expression, whilst also developing pre-writing skills. Furthermore, it's an invitation to learn about colours, mixing and good-old tidying up!



Drawing and Painting



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Playing with blocks, jigsaws, and shape sorters all lay the foundations of spatial thinking, logical reasoning, ordering, and recognising various shapes, sizes, and colours.



Blocks, Jigsaws and Shape Sorters



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Singing and music hugely help to develop language and form the basis of literacy skills, as well as basic mathematical concepts such as counting. Furthermore, they begin to develop rhythm, whilst also refining their listening skills. Dancing helps the child develop strength and flexibility, not to mention coordination.



Music, Dancing and Singing



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All play should be imaginative, but we're referring to the type of play that comes naturally to many children. Leave a small child with nothing but a random selection of objects and you'll soon find them lost in a world of make-believe. Giving a child time and space for imaginative play is essential. It develops their imagination, which is important for literacy skills and intellectual reasoning. Additionally, it increases their sense of self, and self-esteem, as well as making sense of the world around them, as well as the ability to handle boredom.



Imaginative Play



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Children's learning is fuelled with rocket-fuel when you take the play space out in to the great outdoors. That's why Forest Schools are so popular and highly regarded. Not only is it healthy, it teaches a respect for the environment, and the beginnings of biology. It also helps children to become more independent and inquisitive.



Nature Play



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In a nutshell, sensory play is any play activity which involves touch, smell, taste, sight and hearing. This can be provided with a plate of jelly, aqua beads, ice, rice, or even small world tubs. Sensory play stimulates exploration and the building blocks of science and investigation.



Sensory Play



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There are so many board games available for even the youngest players, and these should be embraced – not only for their fun factor, but for their learning potential. In addition to the themes of numbers, colours, shapes, and early phonics, these games are vital for teaching children turn-taking and sharing.



Basic Board Games



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Young children have a compulsion to move. Allowing them to do so, and providing safe and age-appropriate challenges, allows them to increase their confidence as well as develop their resilience through risk-taking. Of course, gross motor skills also receive a mighty boost.



Running, Jumping, Climbing, Swinging



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Yes really! The humble cardboard box is one of the most incredible invitations to play. Will it be a house, a car, a home for their cuddlies? Provide them with scraps of fabric, cushions, pencils and paper plates and watch them explore their world, enter their imagination, and begin thinking like an engineer.

The best laid plans...

Morning Session Time - Doors open at 8.50am – 11.30am

Afternoon Session Time - 12.45pm to 3.15pm

During the morning & afternoon session the children will have...

- Healthy snack and milk



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Help make your child's entry as smooth as possible by ensuring:

- All items of clothing are clearly labelled as well as other personal belongings
- Children are able to dress themselves
- Children have a healthy snack for snack time. (milk provided by school)
- Children will need to bring a drinks bottle
- Children to carry their own bags to nursery to encourage independence
- Your child is independent in using the toilet
- Children will require wet weather clothes and wellies



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Please let us know if:

- Your child has any allergies or other specific medical requirements. Forms already issued.
- If your child is absent from nursery, please ring on the day they are absent and write a note to the class teacher on their return stating reason for absence. Whilst nursery is non statutory - attendance is vitally important.
- You have any questions or concerns – if you have a worry don't keep to yourself.



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Attendance and welfare

Parents and carers have a legal responsibility to make sure their child is in school. This is part of the Education Act 1996.

Children who have good attendance are likely to gain five or more A-C GCSEs or equivalent qualification.

Children who miss school can fall behind. Missing 17 days of school a year also means dropping on average one GCSE grade.

90% attendance at the end of the school year means your child has missed four weeks of school.

Over their secondary school life this is half a school year.

Schools are open to pupils 190 days of the year. This allows 175 days for holidays, rest and non-urgent appointments. Only the head teacher can approve leave of absence. Not the parents.

Good attendance means that pupils have the best chance to:

- keep up with schoolwork
- meet their expected progress
- meet friends to learn and play with
- learn good habits for adult life like regular attendance and arriving on time

Fixed penalty notices

Pay a fixed penalty notice for an unauthorised absence 

Parents whose children have five days of unauthorised absence face a fine.

The notice can be issued for any absence not authorised by the school, including holidays.

The council will issue these notices when concerns are raised by the school or police.

- I am able to talk about myself, my needs & feelings
- I am practising recognising my name when it's written down

Getting dressed & undressed on my own

- I can button & unbutton my clothes
- I can put my own shoes & socks on
- I can put my coat on & use a zip

Interest in the world & new activities

- I enjoy learning about the world around me
- I am interested in exploring new activities or environments
- I like asking questions

Eating

- I can use a knife & fork
- I can open my packed lunch on my own
- I am confident at opening wrappers & packaging

Writing skills

- I like tracing patterns & colouring in
- I enjoy experimenting with different shaped scribbles
- I am practising holding a pencil

Going to the toilet

- I can go to the toilet on my own, wipe myself properly & flush
- I can wash & dry my hands without any help

Independence

- I am happy to be away from my mummy, daddy or my main carer
- I am happy to tidy my belongings & look after my things
- I am feeling confident about starting school

Listening & understanding

- I am able to sit still and listen for a short while

- I'm learning to eat at the times I will on school days



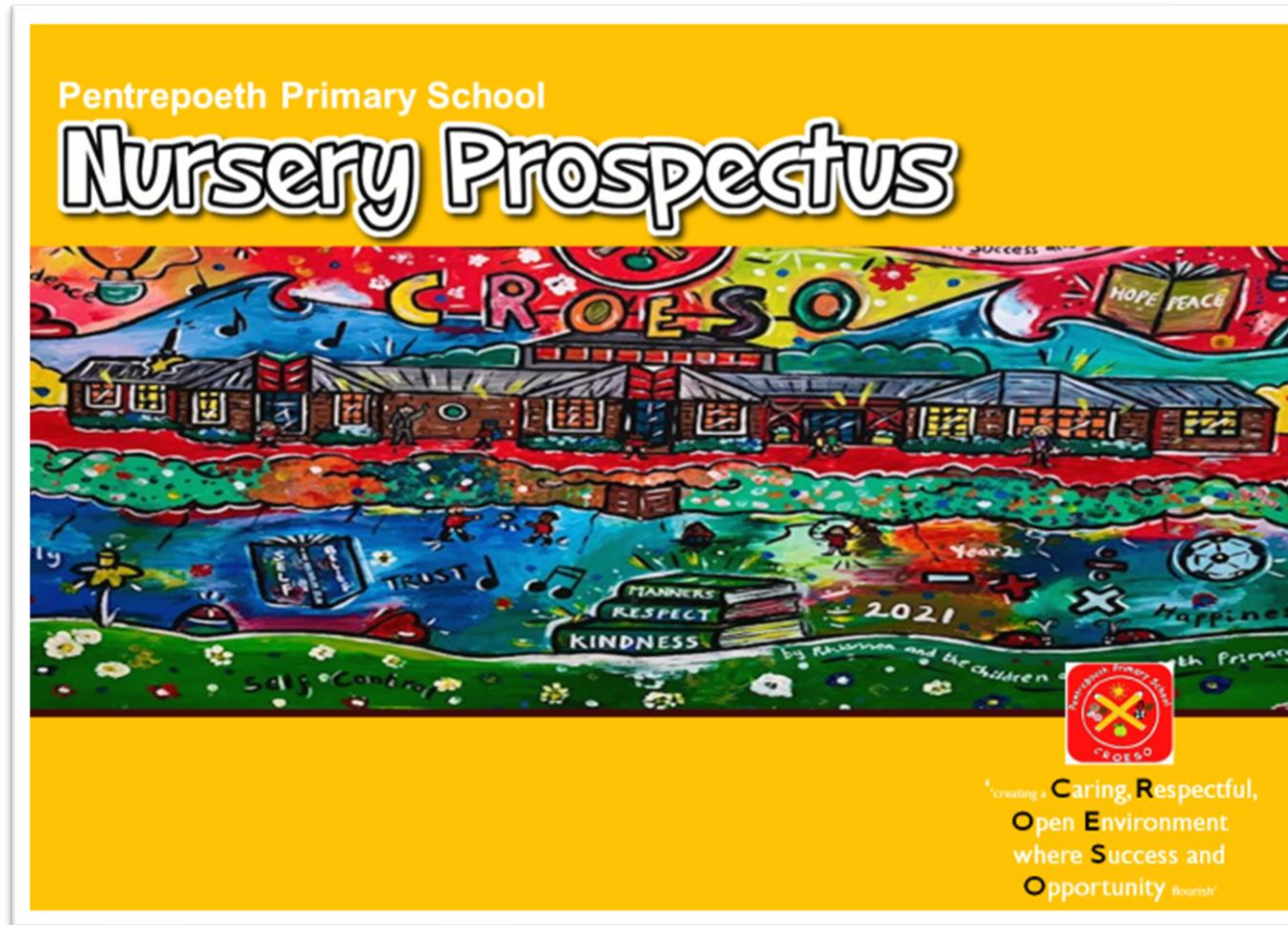
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
